About Santiago and the National Stadium Sports Park

Santiago is Chile's capital and its largest city. It is known for its quality of life, museums, world-class restaurants, vineyards, urban walks, and the Sky Costanera, the tallest viewpoint in South America.

Santiago is surrounded by hills and framed by the impressive Andes Mountain range, which reaches a height of 5,424 meters with Cerro El Plomo. One of the main hills in the city is Cerro San Cristobal, which can be climbed by a funicular or a hike, and offers stunning views of the city.

The city also has a large urban park, the Parque Metropolitano, which is the fourth largest in the world and attracts over 5.5 million visitors each year. Santiago has interesting neighborhoods, such as Barrio Italia, which features a mix of old semirural constructions, beautiful residences, and cités.

The city has a diverse gastronomy scene that incorporates Chilean culinary traditions with influences from neighboring and distant countries. Santiago also has a vast network of bike lanes, offering bike rentals for safe, ecological transportation through its historic neighborhoods and landmarks, such as Lastarria, Concha y Toro, and Yungay.

From the Lonely Planet website: Surprising, cosmopolitan, energetic, sophisticated and worldly, Santiago is a city of syncopated cultural currents, madhouse parties, expansive museums and top-flight restaurants. No wonder 40 percent of Chileans call the leafy capital city home.

It's a wonderful place for strolling, and each neighbourhood has its unique flavour and tone. Head out for the day to take in the museums, grand architecture and pedestrian malls of the Centro, before an afternoon picnic in one of the gorgeous hillside parks that punctuate the city's landscape. Nightlife takes flight in the sidewalk eateries, cafes and beer halls of Barrios Brasil, Lastarria and Bellavista, while as you

















head east to well-heeled neighborhoods like Providencia and Las Condes, you'll find tony restaurants and world-class hotels.

With a growing economy, renovated arts scene and plenty of eccentricity to spare, Santiago is an old-guard city on the cusp of a modern-day renaissance.

National Stadium Sports Park

The renovated National Stadium Sports Park, the epicentre of the Metropolitan Region and the home of millions of citizens of Santiago, hosted the largest number of sports at the Santiago 2023 Pan American and Parapan American Games.

It is Chile's largest high-performance sports park and the largest in the Americas, where new sports facilities are now part of the legacy from staging the multi-sport event.

Located in the heart of the Ñuñoa commune and one of Santiago's great new 'green lungs', its features include open recreational walks and parks for families, with over 10 hectares of green leisure areas for citizens. But one of the great uses of this venue has to do with its new facilities, renovations, and training centres thanks to the high-level infrastructure built for Santiago 2023.

The hockey events at Santiago 2023 took place at the Field Hockey Sports Centre (Centro Deportivo de Hockey Césped), which was inaugurated in March 2022. The complex, which features two International Hockey Federation (FIH) certified playing fields, also staged the FIH Hockey Women's Junior World Cup Chile 2023, with the outstanding arena welcoming the very best young athletes in the world.

















ABOUT THE FIH HOCKEY NATIONS CUP

The FIH Hockey Nations Cup is an annual tournament that involves some of the best hockey playing nations of the world and acts as a pathway to the FIH Hockey Pro League, to which it introduces a relegation/promotion axis, with the first placed team in the FIH Hockey Nations Cup getting the opportunity to replace the bottom placed team in the FIH Hockey Pro League in the subsequent year.

Additionally in 2025, FIH introduced the Hockey Nations Cup 2, which would add another tier below the Nations Cup, with the team winning the Nations Cup 2 earning the opportunity to replace the bottom placed team of the Nations Cup in the subsequent season.

The FIH Hockey Nations Cup features the best eight teams (by world rankings) that are not a part of the FIH Hockey Pro League, in both men's and women's competitions. The eight teams are split into two pools of four teams each, with the top two teams in each pool proceeding to the semi-finals, while the bottom two teams from each pool will play for 5-8 place classification.

The FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup will run from 23 February to 2 March 2025 in Santiago, Chile. The complete match schedule including match timings are available here.



Nickname: Canadian Wolf Pack

Nations Cup 2023/24: 6th

Canada may be coming into the Nations Cup as the lowest ranked team, but with a determined and resilient squad and a proud history in international hockey, their ranking does not figure to be an indicator of their chances of winning the competition.

Known for their disciplined defensive structure, physical fitness, and relentless work ethic, Canada have consistently competed at a high level across various FIH tournaments. The team, which has been bringing about a new generation of players, has made steady progress in recent years, with strong performances in the Pan American Championships and previous FIH Nations Cup editions.

With a balanced mix of experienced leaders and exciting young talents, Canada aims to make a significant impact at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup Chile 2025, with an extremely valuable promotion spot to the FIH Hockey Pro League at stake.

















One to Watch: Karli Johansen

Karli Johansen will arrive at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup 2023/24 as one of Canada's most experienced players. The Canadian squad at the Nations Cup will be filled with young players, with nearly half the squad under the age of 21, and the young team will look to Johansen to show them the way forward. With 75 goals in her 181 appearances, Johansen will also be heavily relied upon to provide the team with an attacking impetus, but on past evidence, she has all the tools required to do just that.

The Chile women's hockey team, known as Las Diablas, has emerged as a rising force in international hockey, driven by passion, skill, and a strong team spirit. With their recent history littered with impressive performances in the Pan American Championships, South American Games and a breakthrough appearance at the FIH Hockey Women's World Cup 2022, Chile continues to showcase its growing presence on the global stage. Backed by a dedicated fan base and the advantage of playing on home soil, Las Diablas will be eager to make history at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup Chile 2025, aiming for a strong performance and the opportunity to secure promotion to the FIH Hockey Pro League which can help them take the next step towards becoming a global hockey powerhouse.

Having finished 7th in the first edition of the FIH Hockey Nations Cup, Chile followed up with a much stronger performance in the second edition. And while they fell just short, losing in the semi-final to eventual winners Spain, they finished the previous edition of the competition with a bronze medal and will have their eyes firmly set on a

















bigger prize this time around, as a promotion to the FIH Hockey Pro League beckons.

One to Watch: Denise Losada Krimerman

Denise Losada Krimerman plays a hugely important role for Chile in both attack and defence. Chile's watertight defence is the bedrock of their playing style as they rely on frustrating their opposition's attack and force errors from them on the counter attack. Krimerman is a crucial cog in the team and brings valuable experience alongside captain Manuela Urroz and Fernanda Flores, while also adding to Chile's greatest goal threat, with her terrific drag flicking from penalty corners.

Nations Cup 2023/24: 5th

Japan are coming into the FIH Hockey Nations Cup Chile 2025 as one of the favourites to win the competition and claim a place in the Pro League.

Ranked 11th in the world, Japan are seeded second in the competition, behind New Zealand, who are the highest ranked team, one spot above Japan, in 10th. However, Japan come into the Nations Cup as the only team to have qualified for, and having played in the Olympic Games Paris 2024, where they finished in the 10th place.

Japan will be banking on their youth at the event, with just six players over the age of twenty five, and no player in their thirties within their squad. The team will rely on the likes of Miyu Suzuki, Mai Toriyama and captain Amiru Shimada, who are young players themselves but with a lot of international experience in their bag already, to guide the remaining majority of the squad through their first big international competition.



















Japan have not failed to qualify for a single edition of the Olympic games since making their debut all the way back in Athens 2004. As the new Olympic cycle begins, Japan's efforts to refresh their squad with young players is a calculated ploy to set up their next great team and a spot in the Pro League will accelerate their efforts to break into the top-10 rankings and aim for their first medal in the games.

One to Watch: Miyu Hasegawa

23-year-old Miyu Hasegawa announced herself on the world stage with a bang as she marked her international debut at the 2023 Asian Games in Hangzhou with 5 goals, top scoring for her team in the process. She added two further goals against Chile and Germany at the FIH Hockey Olympic Qualifiers as Japan qualified for the Olympics, and most recently was the joint third top-scorer at the Bihar Women's Asian Champions Trophy Rajgir 2024. With a long future ahead of her, Hasegawa is certainly a forward to keep an eye on as she continues to go from strength to strength.

The United States women's hockey team will be making their debut in the Nations Cup following their relegation from the FIH Hockey Pro League after finishing in the 9th and final place of the 2023/24 edition of the event.

Since the end of the previous edition of the Pro League, the United Eagles have been trending upward at a rapid rate and their qualification to the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, where they finished a creditable 9th, was definitive proof of their improvement.

Following their Olympic performances, USA come into the Nations Cup as one of the favourites to win it all and make short work of their stay outside the FIH Hockey Pro League. With a dynamic and athletic squad and good recent performances in the Pan American competitions, USA will be a tough assignment for opponents at the Nations Cup. With a strong foundation of young collegiate talent making the step up to the national set up and experienced internationals with plenty of caps at high level

















tournaments, the United Eagles continue to evolve, with the aim to reclaim their place among the world's elite.

At the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup Chile 2025, they will be determined to deliver a powerful performance and fight for promotion to the FIH Hockey Pro League less than a year since their relegation.

One to Watch: Reese D'Ariano

Reese D'Ariano will make her debut for the United States at the FIH Hockey Nations Cup Chile 2025, but for plenty of hockey fans, she is already a familiar name. D'Ariano broke into the international hockey scene in 2023 where she starred for the United States in the Indoor Hockey World Cup, looking at ease against top quality opposition as just a 14-year-old! She won the young player of the tournament at the 2023 edition, and won the same award again this year at the FIH Indoor Hockey World Cup Croatia 2025, while also finishing as the second top-scorer in the tournament as a 16-year-old! With the United States building their squad in preparation for the home Olympics in LA28, Reese D'Ariano is definitely a player to watch out for, not just at the FIH Hockey Nations Cup Chile 2025, but also way beyond!

As the runners up in the previous edition of the FIH Hockey Nations Cup and one of the best defensive teams in international hockey, Ireland will be coming into the Nations Cup as one of the main challengers for the top spot and a promotion to the FIH Hockey Pro League for the 2025/26 season.

The Green Army has established itself as a formidable force on the international stage, combining resilience, tactical discipline, and an unbreakable team spirit. The team made history with a silver medal at the FIH Hockey Women's World Cup 2018, capturing global attention and showcasing their ability to compete with the world's best. With a squad filled with plenty of experience across all positions, Ireland continue to be a strong contender in major tournaments.

At the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup Chile 2025, the Green Army will be determined to put in a dominant performance as they push for promotion to the FIH Hockey Pro League, where their men's team has been playing for the past two seasons, having earned a promotion themselves through the FIH Hockey Nations Cup in 2022.

















One to Watch: Kathryn Mullan

Kathryn Mullan continues to be the heart and soul of the Irish team, captaining the side since 2017. Mullan's build-up play is often crucial in unlocking opposing defences, either through her line breaking passes or her ability to carry the ball from defence on a quick counter attack. If Mullan has a good game, it is near impossible to stop the Irish team from scoring goals, and her performances owen galvanise her team and bring the best out of them. Ireland's oppositions will know that they can try to blunt the Irish attack by stopping Mullan, but that is a task easier said than done.

Nations Cup 2023/24: 8th

Korea, through the late 20th and early 21st centuries were the most successful women's hockey team from Asia. Their list of accolades include two Olympic silver medals, a bronze medal at the World Cup, a Champions Trophy gold medal and five Asian games gold medals and plenty more.

With such a rich history, the Korean team went into most events as one of the favourites, but the team currently finds itself in a transitional phase and with the emergence of China and India in Asia, find themselves on the back foot in the continent as well.

After missing out on an Olympic qualification for just the second time in 34 years at Paris 2024, Korea will look to bounce back at the Nations Cup and a spot at the FIH Hockey Pro League could prove to be the ideal launch pad for the next great Korean team.

Fans of the Korean team will be itching to watch their team get back to their great former heights and while the Korean squad at the upcoming Nations Cup features 11 players 25 or under, the group has largely been playing together for the past 2-3

















years now and the Nations Cup provides an ideal platform for them to take the next step up together.

One to Watch: Eunbi Cheon

Captain Eunbi Cheon is the heart and soul of the Korean team that unsurprisingly performs at its best when their captain is able to play freely. An attacking minded midfielder, Cheon is a master at carrying the ball into the opposition's half and has an excellent scoring record. 73 goals in 175 appearances for Korea makes her one of the most potent scorers in their nation's history, and if Korea aim to win the competition and qualify for the Pro League, they will need Cheon to fire on all cylinders.

Nations Cup 2023/24: 4th

New Zealand arrive at the FIH Hockey Nations Cup Chile 2025 as the highest ranked team in the competition and with an aim to get back to the FIH Hockey Pro League where they last competed in the 2022/23 season.

The Black Sticks are a traditional hockey powerhouse in not just Oceania, but also across the globe. Renowned for their speed, skill, and attacking style of play, they have been regular competitors in the FIH Hockey World Cup, Olympic Games, and Commonwealth Games.

Their history of success includes a gold medal at the 2018 Commonwealth Games, multiple continental championships and the team have narrowly missed out on an Olympic medal on two occasions, finishing in the 4th place in London 2012 and Rio 2016. With a strong core of experienced players complemented by rising stars, New Zealand the Black Sticks will be aiming to dominate their opponents at the FIH Hockey Nations Cup Chile 2025 and make a swift return to the FIH Hockey Pro League in the next season.

















One to Watch: Hannah Cotter

At just 21, Hannah Cotter has shown plenty of promise already. She top-scored for New Zealand in the 2022-23 season of the FIH Hockey Pro League, which was her first experience in the national set-up. While that was the last appearance of New Zealand in the competition, Cotter's performances excited their fans, with her goals coming against some of the best defences, including Netherlands, Germany and China. In the quest to replace the legendary Olivia Merry, who called time on her incredible career in 2024, Cotter will be the amongst those counted upon to provide the team with attacking impetus, and on the evidence thus far, Cotter looks like she will be a mainstay in the team for years to come.

With a strong hockey culture and a history of standout performances in the EuroHockey Championships and Commonwealth Games, Scotland are known for their disciplined defense and an ability to maintain their structures through different phases of play. The team features a mix of experienced leaders and exciting young talent, all eager to showcase their skills on the world stage. As they compete in the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup Chile 2025, the team will be determined to make a deep run in the tournament and challenge for promotion to the FIH Hockey Pro League.

One to Watch: Fiona Burnet

A dynamic and skillful attacker, Fiona Burnet is a key player for the Scottish and one to watch at the FIH Hockey Women's Nations Cup Chile 2025. Known for her speed, agility, and creativity in the attacking circle, Burnet has been a consistent goal threat for Scotland, using her sharp stick skills and intelligent movement to break down defenses. With experience in both domestic and international competition, which include appearances in the 2023/24 season of the FIH Hockey Pro League, as a part of the Great Britain set-up, she brings leadership and composure to the squad. As Scotland looks to make a strong impact in Chile, Burnet's attacking prowess and ability to create goal-scoring opportunities will be vital to their success.
